
You may notice your medicine is a different colour **Shape** Or size.

Your medicine has been prescribed by its chemical (Generic) name instead of the branded name.

Example 2	Clopidogrel	Plavix
Example 3	Cetirizine	Zirtek

What are Generic medicines? A medicine has two names:



2. Brand Name – this is the name given by the manufacturer.

Why are you getting a Generic medicine?

- In many cases, several people can be given medicine for the same price as one person getting the branded medicine. The money saved helps to pay for new treatments for people who need them.
- Using only the generic name can reduce confusion, as your doctor or pharmacist will be familiar with the family of drugs which a medicine comes from.
